About the Organization/Program*

The mission of YWCA Helena is to prevent homelessness, provide safe and supportive housing for women and children experiencing homelessness, and provide services that restore hope, self-sufficiency, and happy and healthy lives. Our Women Initiating New Growth and Stability (WINGS) program supports single, pregnant/postpartum and formerly incarcerated, OUD/SUD/MH homeless women in treatment and recovery through an IOP and step-down Aftercare services. Individual and Group/Family OUD/SUD Therapy, Education Groups, Psychosocial Rehabilitation, Co-Occurring Mental Health Treatment, Face-to-Face Crisis Services and Care Coordination, Peer Support Services, along with comprehensive assistance such as transitional housing, and parenting support services. WINGS is an 18–24-month program addressing the complexities of OUD & SUD/MH disorders and the underlying trauma from violence, sexual assault, adverse childhood experiences, and human trafficking, as well as basic life skills, parental coaching, meal planning, health and wellness, budgeting, early infancy, and behavior health education. Individuals are most often referred to the YWCA Helena from inpatient chemical dependency programs, criminal justice systems, community treatment providers, by Medication Assistance Treatment (MAT) providers, or family treatment court.

In an effort to stabilize the family unit and strengthen the bond between mother and child(ren) we provide 18 of our 20 available rooms for children to reside with their mothers, which we believe adds significant value to their recovery. In 2024, YWCA Helena provided 5,851 nights of shelter to 30 single or parenting women. Twenty-seven indigent children lived at the shelter full time with their mother of which 22 were below the age of 12. In 2024 all of the women were indigent, unhoused or insecurely sheltered before coming to the safety of the women's and children's shelter. We maintain a waitlist of 10-12 women.

All OUD/SUD/MH services occur under the YWCA Helena roof, where the individual feels safe and is learning to trust. However, we have an established relationship with psychiatric providers at PureView Medical Clinic and Helena Indian Alliance, both Federally Qualified Health Clinics (FQHC's) should referral services be required. When behavioral health concerns persist in programming or patterns arise in mental health one-onones, staff will reach out to partner FQHC's and receive immediate support or a referral for services. YWCA

Helena's relationship with St. Peter's Health, includes the ability to connect in the same manner with a behavioral health provider in the hospital's Behavioral Health Unit. The agency's relationships with community partners have been deployed not only for the women of our house, but often for their children who require referral to Intermountain Children's Services or Shodair Children's Hospital. Pregnant women are prioritized during the intake process and wait list. If no space is available, the clinical staff refer and provide a warm handoff to partner agencies such as Lewis & Clark County, Helena Indian Alliance, or other SUD treatment providers. Upon intake, Peer Supports or Housing Advocates partner with women to begin applying for SNAP, Medicaid, TANF, WIC, SSI/SSDI, affordable housing, affordable childcare, and other resources such as job training/career development, and advanced education. Peer Supports help teach self-advocacy and facilitate successful connections to resources. Approximately 70% of all program participants are parenting children under the age of 18 years, and 30% of those families are involved with MTDPHHS Child & Family Services (CFS). As mother's make strides in their recovery process, we work with CFS to provide supervised visits through our Parenting Center. Lastly, Narcan boxes are available on all levels of the YWCA residence and staff have received training for administering Narcan.

Source of Funding*

Grant funding is intended for the creation or expansion of opioid prevention, treatment, and recovery projects. The money is **NOT** meant to replace or supplant existing funding.

Funding is derived from 70% government grants and 30% private donors/foundation grants such as: Medicaid, MT DPHHS Substance Abuse & Disability, Pregnant and Post Partum Women grant; Montana Board of Crime Control Victims of Crime Act; Montana Community Foundation; Helena Area Community Foundation; Montana Justice Foundation and appeals.

YWCA Helena is requesting \$35,000 in MOAT funding to offset up to 25% of the cost to shelter and provide supportive services not covered by government funding, while concurrently investing up to \$15,000 in

workforce development skills for our addiction professionals and compliance data evaluation coordinator. We are not looking to supplant funding for WINGS since program expenses are covered by Medicaid and government grants. However, the total costs of treatment also includes providing safe shelter, transportation services to the food bank, medical appointments, visits to probation and parole, communal computers, educational needs and acquisition of basic personal clothing/supplies for mother and child(ren) since many arrive without basic necessities. This amounts to roughly \$140,000/year in expenses not covered by government grants.

With rising costs in energy bills, fluctuation of gas prices and steep increases in the cost of essentials/supplies, the average cost of room/supportive services at the YWCA is approx. \$580/month. Residents are expected to pay a modest monthly rental fee once they are gainfully employed. However, in the first 90-days residents must participate wholly in their IOP recovery/therapy and may not work.

Government funding sources do not include workforce training. YWCA Helena has witnessed a change in family status of women served. In 2019, nearly 50% of women we served were single with no children. However, in 2024, 80% of women we served either had custody of their children or were working to reunite with their children. This seems to be a new trend in our services post Covid and creates a need for workforce development to support training on best practices in addressing the needs of criminal justice involved, pregnant or parenting homeless women with OUD and co-occurring SUD/MH.

YWCA Helena is state licensed as both a SUD treatment center and a MH center providing transitional (residential) housing and intensive outpatient services and co-occurring treatment for women in recovery with their children. YWCA Helena has served women and their children for over 100 years and is a critical resource for Lewis and Clark County, particularly in response to women and children who have been deeply affected by the Opioid addiction crisis. WINGS therapeutic model of care provides a safe residence for unsheltered women and their children, combined with critical access to OUD recovery programs for women diagnosed with co-occurring SUD/MH disorders. WINGS provided 3,717 hours of clinical outpatient services while 49 children (in and out of residence) benefited from their mothers receiving parenting-focused recovery coaching. In addition to mom's treatment plan, 16 children received mental health services in 2024.

YWCA Helena housed 30 women and 26 children in 2024. 100% of women housed are living at or below poverty level; 100% have co-occurring SUD/MH; 100% are at risk of homelessness; 87% are justice involved; 70% are mothers; and 47% are women of color. In this same year, 7 women graduated from WINGS; 3 residents achieved reunification with their children; 4 graduates were enrolled in higher education at transition. As women transition into community living, WINGS Aftercare continues to provide peer to peer support, mental health and addictions therapies, educational, and therapeutic groups.

The YWCA Helena faces a unique intersection of non-profit and healthcare compliance requirements. Clinical staff are in need of workforce development training to better understand physical, psychological and pharmacological effects of drug abuse, address trauma symptoms, and increase emotional and physiological regulation for our residents. Our data and evaluation coordinator requires additional training for specific compliance demands within the non-profit sector, as well as the necessary security measures to protect patients' health information, while also fulfilling data reporting obligations for grant funding. Furthermore, these training opportunities would enable the implementation of regular internal audits focused on billing practices, documentation, data management and dissemination.

The measurable goal is to graduate at least 30 women and 26 children from the YWCA programs that provide stability, opportunities and education to help them access the resources that are needed to thrive. We maintain connections with graduates and strive to sustain or increase our 80% sobriety rate years after they leave the shelter. To achieve the goal, we must offset costs for supportive services/shelter not covered by government funding during a time of economic uncertainty, placing financial hardships and potentially jeopardizing the resident commitment to recovery.

Specific Goals*

Overarching Goal: We expect to see lower recidivism rates, decreased instances of re-occurring substance use, increased parent/child reunification, increased opportunities for higher education and employment, increased justice system resolution, and ultimately high levels of safety for the women, children, and families that are served.

Objectives:

- Increase the skills of our clinical staff, over a period of one year, to meet the demands for treatment of OUD and co-occurring SUD/MH disorders and increase industry specific knowledge for our data coordinator in Behave, an electronic records system for tracking housing and clinical records.
- o Increase workforce retention by providing career development and career advancement opportunities.
- o Reduce staff turnover, which often results in adverse reactions from residents or loss of historical knowledge for the agency.
- Increase stability of women and children by offsetting a portion of financial barriers related to shelter, transportation, clothing/hygiene (not covered by state/federal/county grants) so they can invest their energy in recovery.

In turn this will benefit residents by:

- Decreasing substance use, depression, symptoms of PTSD
- Increasing self-efficacy, and stabilizing recovery
- Increasing successful and healthy parental unification for healing of the mother and child(ren).
- Increasing number of women & parenting women entering our OUD/SUD/MH program and successfully transitioning out of residency into affordable housing
- o Ensuring no less than 80% of WINGS graduates sustain a life of healthy sobriety

Evaluation Method*

Describe how you plan to evaluate the effectiveness of the program and what the method for evaluation will be.

We will continue to collect data using the Government Performance and Results Act (GPRA) Client Outcome Measures for Discretionary Programs and Pregnant and Postpartum People (which used to be PPW for women) as an assessment tool to collect quantitative and qualitative data for women in WINGS. We transitioned from Advanced MD to Behave in December of 2023 to track specific data of program participants in IOP/aftercare and transitional housing. More recently we developed our WINGS application from Behave in an effort to streamline the intake process.

- 1.) Workforce development We will record the number of trainings provided to clinical and administrative staff (as per the attached spreadsheet). We will also record the number of participants who attended the trainings; total time/length of training; satisfaction with training; pass/fail certifications, continuing education credits attainment as result of training. We will also circle back in three-to-six month intervals from completion of training to see how the knowledge learned is incorporated into our daily operations of program support.
- 2.) Clinical staff will continue the use of the GPRA and PPP as an assessment tool to collect qualitative data for women in WINGS. The Clinical Director and the Data and Evaluation Coordinator work together to ensure resident demographic data, clinical service encounters/hours, and nights of shelter are entered into our medical records system Behave in a timely manner.
- 3.) Shelter and supportive services In addition to tracking measures of successful outcomes of workforce training of staff and alleviating financial stresses of residents, we will assemble monthly actual expenses, to track fluctuations in utility usage, transportation (gas/vehicle repair/cost of goods), and other resident supportive services (not covered by government funding) from our estimate provided in this application.

Data Source*

What information are you going to collect or use to demonstrate you have accomplished your goals?

YWCA Helena will use the information collected through GPRA, Behave, and PPP for data management and performance monitoring methods to further refine our approach when working with women and young children. This data is also used to assess needs in programming and analyzed to assess additional needs within the community.

We are fortunate to already have experience with these systems and can pull relevant records. IOP participants are required to attend nine unique events per week including five morning circles, two IOP group therapy sessions and two individual therapy SUD/MH sessions. This is required until the client prepares a presentation to justify their intentions to move to Aftercare, which requires two morning circles, one Aftercare-based group therapy session and two individual therapy sessions.

Behave medical records system allows YWCA Helena to track the number of encounters /residents IOP attendance in required weekly individual and group therapy, parental coaching (as applicable) and helps identify any unusual trends such as absenteeism adversely affecting completion hours. Prior to March 2025, we had a fillable PDF for applications. More recently we created an online application which allows Behave to retrieve demographic info, interview notes, clinical hours/services and program deliverables from intake to transitioning out of residence and aftercare support hours.

Awareness*

How do you plan to create awareness of this program? Briefly describe what action the program plans to take to create awareness in the community.

The YWCA Helena is committed to sharing best practices and continues to be innovative and informed while addressing the opioid addiction crisis in our state. Data collection is not only a requirement for the majority of

our funding sources, but a necessary component to the YWCA Helena mission of preventing homelessness, by providing safe and supportive housing for women and children experiencing homelessness. Assessments deemed women and children the most vulnerable population across Montana, which drives our vision to deliver services that restore hope, self-sufficiency, so those we serve may achieve happy and healthy lives. Reports are also pulled to quantify rates of success infused with personal stories of success such as our public facing annual Impact report. Impact 2024 was most recently distributed to over 5,000 persons/donors on our mailing list and an electronic copy is hosted on our website, Reports | YWCA Helena (https://ywcahelena.org/reports) along with former years reporting. We also provide reports when asked by federal, state, county/city grantors, and Board members.

With MOAT funding in support of training, our clinical staff will achieve certifications and/or credentialing, which will be added to the Team page of our website to bolster individual and team qualifications in support of YWCA Helena's evidence-based WINGS treatment program for OUD, and co-occurring SUD/MH disorders in homeless, single, pregnant, post-partum, justice involved women. In addition to parental coaching to retain/reunify women with their children and life skills to transition from homelessness to self-sufficiency.

With MOAT funding covering 25% of room/board coupled with supportive services, it allows us to utilize private donor funds to continue much needed improvements to our 100+ year old residence for residents and for reconfiguring space for treatment of trauma for children and families who are affected by family member's OUD/SUD/MH.
